### Pastor's Message

Dear Members and Friends of the Williston Federated Church

*"There is no life that is not in community, and no community not lived in praise of God." T.S. Eliot. Choruses from the Rock*

As I begin my ministry among you, one of my first impressions is the sense of community that is present here in this church family. What I am finding is a community that lives and has its being - not only in praise of God - but also is a community that sings, prays, nurtures, educates, laughs, learns, shares stories, listens, practices compassion, reaches out to the community and to the world, eats, gives generously, attends peace vigils, lives in hope, struggles with challenges, gets hands dirty with good, honest work, and embodies the unconditional love of God.

One of the books I have read recently (and you will learn that I love to read - and often quote from these books) is Stilling the Storm: Worship and Congregational Leadership in Difficult Times by Kathleen S. Smith. Let me clarify, I do *not* feel that we are in difficult times - it was a book recommended by a pastoral colleague and it is excellent. (Just to let you know: in the past month I've also read Water for Elephants by Sara Gruen - and I'm not planning on joining the circus! - and A Day Apart: How Jews, Christians, and Muslims find Faith, Freedom, and Joy on the Sabbath by Christopher Ringwald)

I would like to share with you some thoughts from Kathleen Smith's book: *Christianity is a "first-person plural" religion, where communal worship, service, fellowship, and learning are indispensable for grounding and forming individual faith. The strength of Christianity depends on the presence of healthy, spiritually nourishing, well-functioning congregations. Congregations are the cradle of Christian faith, the communities in which children of all ages are supported, encouraged, and formed for lives of service. Congregations are the habitat in which the practices of the Christian life can flourish. As living organisms, congregations are by definition in a constant state of change. Whether the changes are in membership, pastoral leadership, lay leadership, the needs of the community, or the broader culture, a crucial mark of healthy congregations is their ability to deal creatively and positively with change. The fast pace of change in contemporary culture, with its bias toward, not against, change only makes the challenge of negotiating change all the more pressing for congregations.*

Again, let me clarify. Although we are not living in *difficult* times, we are living in a time of *transition* as we enter more deeply into those places where God is calling us to mutual ministry and faith partnership. Let us share those stories from our heritage which bless us; and let us dream of the community that God calls us yet to be.

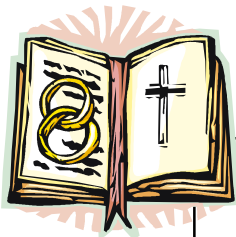

## Mississippi Mission Trip

Williston Federated Church members will lead another trip to Mississippi December 2<sup>nd</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> to help with Katrina recovery. This will be the third trip for Tony Lamb and Ken Stone and the first or second for others from our congregation. We travel to Vancleave, Mississippi, where we stay at the Methodist Church. They have dorms and showers for sixty volunteers. As they have done for the twenty plus months since Katrina, they provide two hot meals a day, fixings for lunch and bedding for the week

UMCOR has a representative on site and he (Curt) coordinates the work with case workers. They prioritize the needs and insure that there is little duplication of efforts. They also provide the materials. They match our skills with the work to be done. It is not important that each person have building skills, as there are many other things to do, and as they emphasize each time we go, our presence there is our most precious gift.

We currently have 25 people from six different churches signed up to go. There is still room for five more people. Costs include air fare which is now \$250, rental vans at about \$70 a person for the week, \$100 donation for room and board, and \$40 for meals out.

We would like to raise \$2,000 in donations for materials. This money enables us to supplement what UMCOR provides, which is limited for each home. We typically find that there is much more work that needs to be done beyond the resources available. A collection will be taken on November 18<sup>th</sup> for this mission, and there is also a jar in which to place donations in the downstairs hallway.

## A Call for Volunteer "Readers"

On December 7, 2007 Wheeler Elementary School will participate in a community initiative called Reading to End Racism to support the District wide goal of promoting and valuing diversity in Burlington Public Schools. This project creates an opportunity for students to listen to new literature, hear personal stories and join age-appropriate forums to explore and explain racism.

Classroom presentations are led by volunteer "readers" who are solicited throughout the community, all of whom are committed to the elimination of racism. These "Readers" serve as powerful role models for students, and in the past have included police officers, elected officials, educators, artists, business professionals, parents and school board members. Entire schools are enlisted in one-day presentations involving all classes, with book readings, personal stories and discussions on ways students can help end racism. Results from Boulder Valley School District in Boulder, Colorado where thousands of students were offered Reading to End Racism show over 85% believed they had an increased understanding of racism after participating.

This project is a collaborative effort by the Burlington School District, The Women's International League for Peace and Freedom and VARAT (The Vermont Anti-Racism Action Team). Please join us on Wednesday evening November 7, 2007 at 6:30-8 pm in the Learning Center for a volunteer readers training and dialogue on "how to continue the conversation about bigotry and racism with children." Don't miss this opportunity to explore resources to continue the dialogue at home,
